Cremated remains may be scattered at the Crematorium in the Gardens of Remembrance, buried in a churchyard or cemetery or you may wish to have your loved ones ashes with you at home. Family members may also like a keepsake with a token amount of ash.

There are several choices of container for all these purposes and this can be discussed when you feel the time is right.
